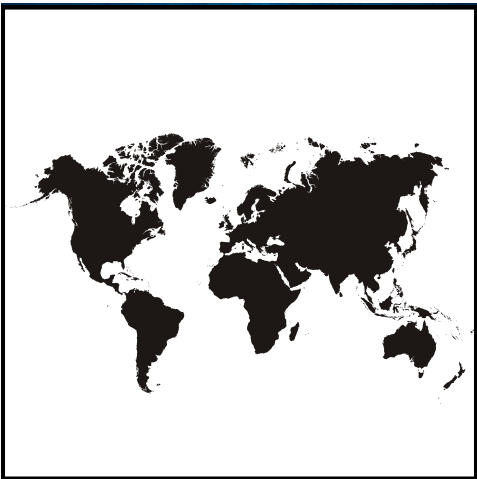

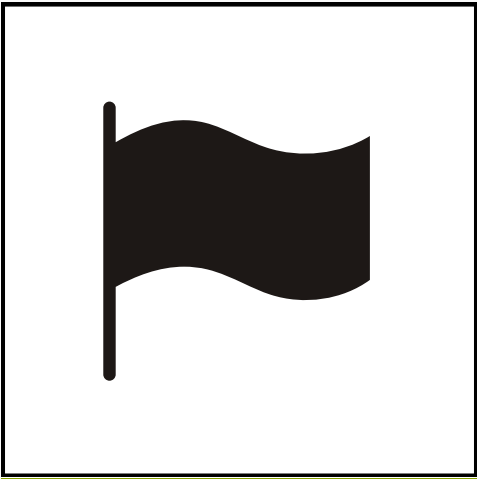

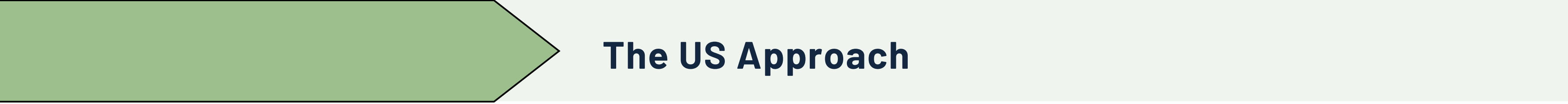

Humanitarian Principles
